GENERAL RULES FOR DEBATE

General Rules of Parliamentary Procedure:

The meeting of the Presbytery is to be conducted decently and in order, with civil regard for the best exchange of views and discernment among the ministers and elder commissioners. Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised shall be the referenced guide, with the Moderator as the presiding officer.

General Rules of Decorum:

- Always address your comments to the Moderator, not to the body or particular participants.
- Avoid personal references to the comments or opinions of other participants in the meeting.
- Know what you want to say and do before you seek to be recognized to speak.
- ➤ Elder commissioners are especially sought to express their views in parity with ministers.
- Avoid corporate outbursts of positive or negative regard for an expressed opinion
- Seek the advice of the Moderator or Stated Clerk if confused by rising and seeking "A Point of Clarification"

Specific Rules for Procedure:

- 1. To Speak, Raise a Question or Make a Motion:
 - i Stand to be recognized by the Moderator;
 - i Be recognized by the Moderator;
 - i Give name, indicate minister or elder and congregation;
 - i State your business before the governing body;
 - i Refrain from speaking more than once if others wish to be heard.

Motions:

- i I move that...or I recommend that...etc.;
- i The maker of a motion has the privilege of the floor immediately following the seconding of the action;
- i During debate, please indicate at the beginning whether you are speaking "for" or "against" the motion; or
- i If you are asking for information or clarification.
- 3. Seconding the Motion:
 - i You need not wait to be recognized by the Moderator.
- 4. Items Not Needing a Second:
 - i Report from a committee;
 - i Nominations
 - i A question of privilege;

i A call for division in voting.

5. Amendments:

- i There may be only one amendment to a main motion pending at one time. This first-degree amendment may have only one amendment (second degree) pending at one time;
- i Amend by: insert, (words, paragraph), strike out (consecutive words, paragraph) or strike out and insert (words) substitute (paragraph).
- i Once a motion has been amended, the motion as amended must then be voted on by the Presbytery.

6. To Stop Debate and Order an Immediate Vote:

- i Stand to be recognized by the Moderator.
- i Move to call for the previous question (which requires a second)
- i A vote must be taken to determine whether the governing body is ready to stop debate.
- i A 2/3 vote is required to stop debate.

7. Tie Vote:

- i Motion is lost.
- i A member may request a second vote.

8. Desiring a Count:

i Following a voice vote, any commissioner may call for a division of the house. A commissioner does not need to wait to be recognized by the Moderator. A count must be taken.

9. Point of Order:

- i A commissioner may question the Moderator as to whether the rules of the body are being implemented:
- i A commissioner may appeal a decision by the Moderator.
- i To call for a point of order, stand and request a point of order.
- i Upon recognition by the Moderator, state your point.

10. Question of Privilege:

- Object to get the attention of the Moderator at once; to ask a question; to attend to some matter of business that cannot wait;
 - i Stand and indicate that you have a question of privilege;
 - i Upon recognition, state your question or concern.

TO MAKE, AMEND OR SUBSTITUTE A MOTION OR TO AMEND OR SUBSTITUTE A RECOMMENDATION:

The recommendations that are being made to the Presbytery have been thought through by the Presbytery committees for the consideration of the court. These usually need some group to be responsible for seeing that they are carried out.

Therefore, it is suggested that you think through carefully any substitute or amendment to any motion and write it down.

Stated Clerk's Report Ann Elyse Hicks, Stated Clerk

Items for Information:

- 1. Who are the members of the governing body? The members of the governing body are the thirty-eight teaching elders who are members of Abingdon Presbytery, the ten Commissioned Ruling Elders, and the fortyeight ruling elder commissioners that represent the forty-eight congregations of the Presbytery. For the purpose of this meeting of Presbytery, the members of the Presbytery are signified by either a blue dot or a yellow dot on your name tag that you received when you registered for this meeting of Presbytery. A blue dot on your name tag signifies that you are a minister member of Presbytery, while a yellow dot indicates that you are an elder commissioner. For this meeting of Presbytery, only minister members and elder commissioners have the privilege of voice and vote at this meeting. If you do not have either a blue dot or a yellow dot on your name tag, then you do not have the privilege of voice or vote at this meeting, only those members in attendance with either a blue dot or a yellow dot on their name tag have the privilege of addressing the Presbytery and voting on action items before the governing body.
- 2. If you are wearing an adhesive name tag, this signifies that you are a visitor to this meeting of Presbytery. If the way be clear, then visitors will be permitted to speak and participate in the round table discussions but shall not be allowed to speak in the plenary discussion or vote on issues before the Presbytery.
- 3. Thank you to the Presbyterian Children's Home of the Highlands, in conjunction with Wytheville, Anchor of Hope, and Galena Presbyterian Churches for hosting us this morning.
- 4. Land acknowledgement rationale: In 2016, the 222nd General Assembly condemned the "Doctrine of Discovery," which allowed colonial powers to claim lands belonging to its inhabitants during the Age of Discovery. Travelers who represented European Christian monarchs could claim the land if those who lived there were not of the Christian faith. Thus, at the 223rd General Assembly in 2018, the PMA Board recommended that each mid-council should begin meetings with an acknowledgement of whose land they are meeting on, and that Indigenous peoples currently living on the land should be invited to bring greetings when possible. The land that we meet on today in Wytheville was once home to the

Cherokee, Moneton, Yuchi, and Yesan (Tutelo) peoples.

<u>I tems for Action:</u>

The following constitute a single omnibus motion. Unless someone asks to take each item individually for discussion, all will be approved together as one vote.

Minutes of the Commission to Ordain Katherine Campbell Abingdon Presbytery, Gathered at Central Presbyterian Church Sunday, June 25, 2023, 2:00 pm

The Commission gathered at Central Presbyterian Church at 1:30 p.m. on Sunday, June 25, 2023.

Rev. Ann Aichinger, as the convener led the Commission in prayer. After introducing those serving on the commission, Katherine Campbell reviewed the order of worship and Jane Davis was appointed as Clerk of the Commission. The service began with a Prelude and Processional of the Commission. Music for the service was led by the Sanctuary Choir of Central Presbyterian.

The Congregation was welcomed by Rev. Ann Aichinger. John Barker led the Responsive Call to Worship, Alice Freeman led the Prayer of Confession and the Assurance of Pardon, and David White read the scripture, Leviticus 8:22-30 and John 21:15-18.

The sermon, "Three Rights," was given by Katherine's mother, Rev. Rebecca Wilkins. Special Music included an organ solo "Simple Gifts" played by Mrs. Joy Briggs, Jane Davis led the congregation in the Profession of Faith stating the Apostles' Creed and Rev. Grace Kim, Moderator of the Presbytery, led the ordination portion of the service. She asked Katherine Campbell the Constitutional Questions, led the Prayer of Installation, and gave the Declaration of Ordination. Rev. Ann Aichinger gave the Charge to the Newly Ordained Katherine Campbell and presented her with a gift from the congregation and a stole as a symbol of service.

The Congregation sang the hymn, "God be the Love to Search and Keep Me." Rev. Katherine Campbell gave the benediction and dismissed the congregation.

After the conclusion of the service, the Commission briefly reconvened in order to dismiss the commission. Education and Leadership Development Committee

In addition to emphasizing our Presbytery's commitment to being a Matthew 25 governing body, we are also raising up stories and reports and testimonies of the church 'beyond the walls' of the sanctuary and the days other than Sunday. As I saw on a T-shirt at the Wild Goose Festival in July, "Jesus Has Left the Building." You will be hearing stories of moments when the Spirit intersected with our lives. You will be hearing stories of mission partners beyond the purely spiritual, in the everyday world, 'those who are not against us' and therefore with us. You will be hearing from Cindy Corell, a PCUSA mission worker, about Haiti. And since our Presbytery meeting today is accenting "fun" (yay), two different musical groups will be playing, like Valley Grass (who will be starting out at 9:20 am) and another fellowship offering tunes and yes even testimony about how Jesus has impacted and transformed their lives.

We have listened carefully to your joys and concerns, those expressed in a recent assessment with which you participated at another Presbytery meeting recently.

While we did not achieve a lot of attendance at the late winter church administrators' luncheon, we felt it was a good effort and will continue to find ways to be supportive of the administrative side of church work. [Our thanks to Linda Cole and April DiYorio for their hard work here.] We also held a Presbytery-wide youth event which was a lot of fun – we spent hours in the pool – but also did not achieve a lot of participation. However, we learn from our efforts and will adjust.

We gave out three camp scholarships this year. New AED purchases are still open to a \$250.00 grant, from our committee and AP.

As much as anything else, the assessments showed congregations and their leadership wanted to gain some inspiration and energy, as well as feeling connected to others in the Jesus' struggle, you know — 'the harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few.' We promise to continue to do our best to serve our congregations and members here in Southwest Virginia.

Mission Ministries and Partnerships Committee Mike Klumpp, Chair

Items for Information:

Meeting opened with prayer.

Reverend Weller reported on the situation in Ethiopia and brought news from a recent meeting of the Ethiopian Mission Network. He reported that the property from which his previous mission work was conducted had been bombed and many families displaced. The refugee status is extreme. The Synod is praying for peace to be restored. However, it was noted that amidst the chaos, God's presence was being felt and many were coming to Christ in tribulation. The committee paused to pray for the nation and the work in Ethiopia. Rachel Weller may need to return to Ethiopia for future meetings. The committee offered that we would like to assist with travel costs at such a time as this became evident.

Reverend Hicks updated the committee on the Kenya trip and ministry. Discussion ensued as to the procedure for advancing the money which is designated for the well in Mwamba. Reverend Klumpp is negotiating the process of geological study for the proper location of the well. The study must proceed the bore hole.

A letter was shared requesting funds to assist with a feeding effort by Sinking Springs Church. There was a motion to grant the requested amount. It was seconded and approved.

There was motion to request a luncheon at Wytheville Presbyterian for Sasha Tsutserov. Sasha will present his testimony and discuss his ministry in Moscow for an audience of the Abingdon Presbytery. The luncheon is to be held on the 28th of October. The motion was seconded and approved.

On the 19th of June another meeting of the committee was held. There was a presentation by Open Table Ministries of a social media centered networking tool for dealing with issues such as homelessness, transients, substance abuse and general needs for those experiencing financial insecurity. The Missions Committee is currently reviewing the program to assess viability within Abingdon Presbytery.

During the assembly committee meetings on Tuesday, June 25 – Thursday, June 27, most commissioners and advisory delegates will participate remotely from their home, office, or another location with reliable internet service and minimal distractions.

For the business meetings in Salt Lake City, commissioners and advisory delegates must be present in person in the plenary hall to participate. There will not be an option to join the deliberations or vote remotely.

Abingdon Presbytery is looking for volunteers to serve as commissioners and YAAD (Young Adult Advisory Delegate). We need one Ruling Elder and One Teaching Elder and one YAAD plus one alternate for each. YAADs must be 18 to 23 on June 25, 2024, to be eligible to serve.

Abingdon Presbyterian Women's Report to Abingdon Presbytery at The Presbyterian Children's Home of the Highlands Carol Propst, Moderator

The Women of Abingdon Presbytery celebrate the pursuit of justice, peace, equity, leadership, charity, Bible study, and spiritual growth.

In April Carol submitted the 2022 Historian's Report from Abingdon PW to SMA Historian Helen Dean, as well as 14 individual church PW histories to the archive at Columbia Theological Seminary in Decatur, Georgia. Abingdon PW continues to search for a Historian; please contact Carol at cpropst980@comcast.net if you are interested in serving in this capacity.

The 35th Annual Spring Gathering of Abingdon Presbyterian Women was held on Saturday, April 22, 2023, at Walnut Grove Presbyterian Church in Bristol, Virginia. Thirty (30) people attended, including 24 women of Abingdon Presbytery from nine different churches, four guests, and two guest speakers from featured organizations. Highlights of the Gathering included keynote speaker Jenny Boggs, Client Services Coordinator of Bristol Faith in Action, who spoke about the organization's mission and needs. The project for the Gathering was for attendees to donate cleaning supplies to help stock BFIA's pantry. Billy Rice, Director of the Presbyterian Children's Home of the Highlands, gave an update on events at PCHH and detailed the upcoming clothing ministry being planned at the Home that will engage the students and community as well as the staff of PCHH. An offering of \$600 was collected at the Gathering to support PCHH. Beth Patterson provided an explanation of the PW 2023 Birthday Offering. The Rev. Ann Aichinger, pastor of Central PC, gave a brief introduction to the new Horizons Bible study Sacred Encounters: The Power and Presence of Jesus Christ in Luke-Acts (2023-2024). Carol offered an invitation to attend the PW Synod Summer Gathering at Massanetta Conference Center on June 8-11, 2023, and provided registration forms for everyone, emphasizing that six \$250 scholarships are being offered by Abingdon PW to anyone from our Presbytery who would like to attend the Gathering. The assembled group also watched a video from Clayton Rascoe about the Massanetta Springs building project, "Building a Place for All." The Rev. John Markel, pastor of the host church, offered a meditation and served Holy Communion. The Gathering concluded with a Necrology Service for the women of Abingdon PW who were reported deceased in 2022. The names of 42 women from 22 churches were read aloud, and a representative for each church placed

a white or pink rose in a vase at the front of the sanctuary in memory of each woman honored in the ceremony.

Carol provided a written quarterly Abingdon PW report that was included in the Docket for the 146th Stated Meeting of Abingdon Presbytery held on May 11, 2023, at Dinwiddie PC.

Three women from Abingdon PW, Mary Ann Blevins, Beth Patterson, and Carol Propst, attended the Presbyterian Women's Synod of the Mid-Atlantic 34th Summer Gathering at Massanetta Conference Center on June 8-11, 2023. The Gathering, titled "Sacred Encounters with Jesus and One Another," was the first in-person PW Synod gathering since the pandemic. Attendees enjoyed morning devotions, engaging plenary sessions with inspiring music and speakers, and excellent workshops. The keynote speaker was bestselling author Shani E. McIlwain, who hosts a Facebook Live weekly web show called "Sharing with Shani." Through humor, honesty, and compassion, Shani strives to teach women and men how to use daily practices to form a spiritual and intimate relationship with God. Featured were Bible Study sessions led by 2023-2024 Horizons Bible Study author the Rev. Dr. Olive Mahabir, mission speaker Bobbie Monaco who has been a medical missionary to Kenya, the State of PCUSA/PW address by PW Executive Director Susan Jackson-Dowd, and a beautiful Sunday worship service led by the Rev. Colleen Earp. PW SMA Historian Helen Dean provided a beautiful PowerPoint Necrology that honored all the women of the Synod of the Mid-Atlantic who passed away in 2022, including our 42 from Abingdon Presbytery.
